Colons Volunteer To Adopt Hokkaido Farmer's Daughters

William Colon, a civilian with the U.S. Forces in Japan, and his wife volunteered Tuesday to be foster parents for the two small daughters of a poor Hokkaido farmer who this month started serving a three-year prison sentence.

The Colons made their offer after learning of a nationwide search for foster parents, launched through The Mainichi Daily News by Brother Zeno Zebrowski, a noted Polish mis-sionary in Tokyo and director of the Franciscan Mission's Welfare for Orphans and the Poor.

Colon, who is working in the Far East Communications office in Fuchu Station, said he and his wife would take care of the two young girls until their father, Tetsuo Mori, 32, a widower, is released from jail.

Mori, a member of the Lutheran Church, was sentenced to three years in prison August 25 for having caused the death of his eldest son last

After receiving the offer, Brother Zebrowski immediately advised Colon to contact directly the grandfather of the two girls in Hokkaido.
