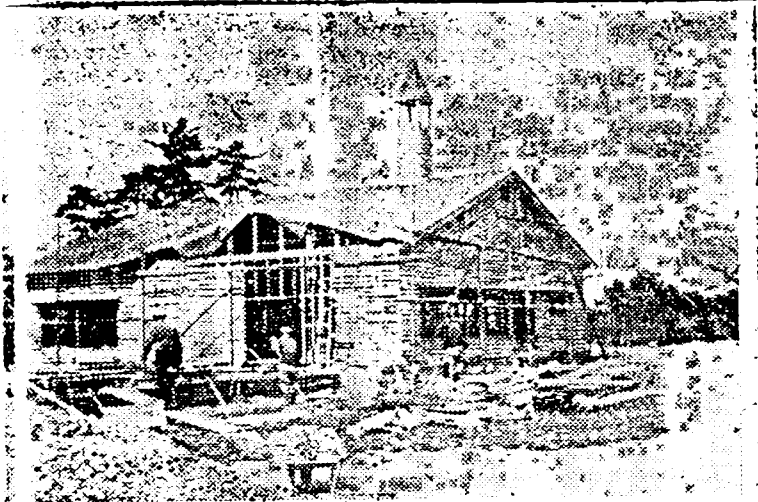

Sending Relief Goods To Hokkaido

NISHINOMIYA, Hyogo, July 19—About 8,000 items of food and clothing were packed today at the Nikawa Gakuin schools here for shipment to Hokkaido to relieve the plight of famine-stricken farming families.

The goods were donated by students of Nikawa Gakuin, who responded to the call of

Father Zebrowski Zeno of St. Francisco Monastery in Higashi-Murayama City, Tokyo. Father Zeno has been leading a relief campaign for the famine-stricken Hokkaido farmers.

The relief goods, along with ¥30,000 in cash, will be sent to Hokkaido in a few days.
