The group is a dedicated one and takes its work among the patients very seriously.

It started six years ago with a program for the children in pediatrics. Now the service not only has a recreation program for the youngsters but an escort service for all patients which releases nurses for more professional duties.

MEMBERS TAKE patients for treatment or examinations in the various departments, such as X-ray, cardiograph and physiotherapy, and escort them from admittance to assigned rooms.

They also handle the library cart. But the work they are most proud of is the assistance with clerical records in the laboratory. Trained by lab personnel, they make out and file detailed records on numerous tests. In the 2½ years they have been working in the laboratory, Dr. Malcolm Hyman, chief pathologist, has been enthusiastic about their accom-
